Annual General Meeting

The Society held its annual general meeting on Saturday, February 16, at Eling Court day room. Around 50 members attended and heard reports from the Society's executive committee on activities during the past year.

The notable points were:

Grants and Funding: Donations from Tovil Parish Council, Tesco, Golding Homes, A-Plant and others had brought in £6,490.

Treasurer's Report: The Society ended the year with a balance of £17,775.

Membership: Membership reached 534 – a new record since the Society's foundation in the year 2000.

Social media: The society's website had been updated and we were making more use of social media, with one Facebook post reaching 2,082 people.

Land Management: The list of tasks carried out by the Tuesday work party over the year extended to two pages and are too numerous to mention here. Suffice it to say that the work party leader Bryn Cornwell was very pleased with progress and thanked his volunteers for their dedication. (Anyone can join the work party. Just turn up at the Conservation Cabin in Cave Hill at 10am on any Tuesday.)

Hayle Park Nature Reserve: The trust's chairman, Paul Wilby, was unable to attend, but trustee and local councillor Brian Clark delivered a report on progress at the reserve in his place. The trustees were hopeful of soon adding a second large piece of land to the reserve: the former tip site at the top of Farleigh Hill, currenty owned by MBC.

Social events: A music night had been organised for Friday, May 3, at Boughton Monchelsea Village Hall with The Runaways. (see opposite page)

Tickets for the summer barbecue on Saturday, July 20, could now be ordered from Alan on **01622 751926** at £10 each. Music this year will be from a new band: The Swinging Sixties

Elections: The new executive committee for 2019 sees just one change. Colin Holman stood down and his place has been taken by John Robertson. We thank Colin for his loyal service over many years and welcome John to the team.

Housing targets

Barely 18 months after it finally adopted its Local Plan that was supposed to direct development until 2031, Maidstone Borough Council has embarked on its Local Plan Review.

To be fair to the council, this is a new Government requirement that Local Plans are reviewed every five years – and Maidstone will need to publish its reviewed plan in 2022.

It reflects the Government's ambition to build 300,000 new homes across the UK each year. It is telling local authorities they must meet a housing target calculated by a "standardized method" which takes into account the Ministry of Housing's projections for "household" growth and is adjusted by the local "affordability ratio" - a measure of the average house price in the area compared with the average income.

When the Local Plan was adopted, it was determined that Maidstone needed to build 883 homes a year. You will not be surprised to learn the new calculations give a much higher figure.

For Maidstone, it equates to 1,244 homes per year.

However, the Government has said that any increase in housing requirement would be capped at 40% of the figure in a made Local Plan – for Maidstone that equates to $1.4 \times 883 = 1,236$ new homes per year.

That is the figure that MBC is now telling councillors and parish councils that it needs to find land for. The council will have to allocate development sites for the difference between the new yearly target and the existing target for each of the nine years left to run in the Local Plan (3,177 homes) plus the new plan will run for an additional six years for which the full yearly allocation must be found (7,416) giving a new target of 10,593 extra homes to be found.

If members are disbelieving about why Maidstone's population should be expanding so much, you need to look at the assumptions made in the Government's population forecasts. It predicts that Maidstone's population will rise by 11.9% in the 10 years from 2014. Of that, an increase of 3.2% will be the "natural" rise in population (births over deaths), an increase of 5.8% will be migration into the area from other parts of the UK (Londoners moving out and Northerners moving South), and an increase of 2.9% is the result of net immigration.

That means that 2,581 of the extra new homes to be built on our green fields in Maidstone are for people who are not yet even in the country.
