

## Traffic calming

With the current five-week closure of Loose Road for gas main repairs, the traffic situation through the Loose Valley has, of course, got even worse.

Even though there are signs in place warning that the Valley is unsuitable as a diversion route, and even though SGN has “spotters” sitting at each end with the task of stopping HGVs from turning into the road, nevertheless, there have been frequent instances when the road has become completely jammed, with the police called on at least one occasion.

Residents in Hayle Mill have suffered damage to their gutters and fencing as traffic has clipped them, as it squeezes in too tightly in an attempt to get past.

And residents and pedestrians have been treated to some ripe language as drivers argue over who should give way!

We mentioned in our last newsletter how, even before the closure, the Society was intending to look into traffic-calming measures to reduce the volume and speed of traffic through the Valley.

A committee of 13 volunteers has now been set up, which has split into groups to investigate the pros and cons of the various solutions previously suggested by members in our brief survey.

They are looking at road closure, pinch-points, a 20mph speed limit, and assorted other smaller ideas that might nevertheless help, such as better signage, cutting back roadside vegetation and having a painted centre line on the bend at the top of Teasaucer Hill.

# Work Party



No matter what the traffic situation, our work party members are out in the Valley every Tuesday, beavering away to ensure it looks good.

Recently, the volunteers have been repointing the lime mortar in the retaining wall at Crisbrook Meadow.

They have also had their Autumn tidy-up, reducing the height of the hedge by the Cabin and cutting back vegetation on the bank by Crisbrook Cottages.

The group has also been strimming an area in Crisbrook Meadow and clearing the bank below Mount Ararat, ready for next year's project – to create a wildflower meadow.

Elsewhere, Tovil Parish Council finds itself currently without a grounds maintenance contractor.

The work party has offered to help by cutting back the undergrowth in the historic Anabaptist Burial Ground (in Burial Ground Lane) as part of our wider community work.
